

1. NOVEMBER 4TH.
2. Yes. This is the end of the run for some penalty purposes.
3. Yes. Same reasons.
4. No. This is part of a loose ball play, so for penalty enforcement it will go back to the previous spot. Now, an argument can be made we beanbag fumbles so the players, fans, coaches know we have a fumble and not an incomplete pass, but for penalty reasons you do not have to throw the beanbag.
5. Illegal kick, flag. Options, take the result of the play, or since it foul during a loose ball play, it would be penalized from the spot of the illegal kick because it is a foul by A behind the basic spot. Illegal kick is a 15 yard foul.
6. OK. Poorly worded question. The questions should say it is near R's 5 yard line. This is going to raise some debate, but the answer is result of the play is a touchback because force is never a factor on kicks going into R's end zone. Free kick you would penalize from previous spot if accepted, and scrimmage kick, since the basic spot would be the 20, it is a foul behind the basic spot, so penalize them from the 5.
7. Tell the coach we will look for it, but if any part of the blocker's body is in the zone at the snap, then they are considered in the zone. Also the zone is 4 yards from each side of the center, so unless the lineman have unusually wide splits (like Sussex used to run), then there is a good chance the end is in the zone.
8. 7-3-2 states both players must be in or behind the neutral zone for a forward handoff to occur. You can also hand it to a lineman who has clearly faced his goal line by moving both feet in a half-turn and is at least 1 yard behind his line when he receives the ball. The penalty is 5 yards and loss of down.
